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# Nine Ways to Climb a Brick Wall

- 1. Draft Records: www.archives.gov
- 2. Homestead Records: www.glorecords.blm.gov
- **3. Nonpopulation Censuses:** From time to time, Congress asked census takers to collect additional information about farming and manufacturing. These supplemental schedules can add valuable details to your family's story.
- 4. County or City Voter Registrations: Before 1906, each state had its own residency requirements for voter eligibility. After that date, citizenship was required before an immigrant could vote.
- **5. Court Records:** Search for documents detailing divorces, wills, adoptions, civil and criminal proceedings, deeds and mortgages, naturalizations, military discharges and more. Start with the county courthouse where your ancestors resided. If you can't make the trip in person, search the Family History Library's catalog (www.familysearch.org/Eng/Library/FHLC/ frameset\_fhlc.asp) and order microfilms.
- **6. Coroners' Records:** Again, start with the county courthouse. You may find death certificates and burial permits. Don't forget to contact local funeral directors.

- 7. Marriage Bonds and Licenses: At the city, township or county level, you may find marriage intentions, bonds, licenses, returns or registers, prenuptial contracts and certificates. To find your ancestors' marriage records, first try the state's vital records office. A good vital records information Web site is www.vitalrec.com/
- 8. Genealogical Periodicals: Ask your local librarian to help you locate periodicals (magazines or newsletters) that cover your area of interest.
- **9. Railroad Records:** If you discover your ancestor's Social Security number on a death certificate or in the Social Security Death Index, and the first three numbers fall between 700 and 728, you know that he received retirement benefits from the US Railroad Retirement Board. Go to www.rrb.gov/geneal.html or write the US Railroad Retirement Board, Office of Public Affairs, 844 N Rush St., Chicago, Il. 60611.

### **National Genealogical Society Quarterly**

Volume 91, No. 4, December 2003 is a special issue taking note of the NGS Centennial. This reminds us that, as genealogists, we must compile and create meaningful studies by doing solid research.

If one is looking for good examples of documenting your sources, this *Quarterly* can certainly show you the way. Each year, the *Quarterly* presents the winner of its Family History Writing Contest. The last volume of the year also presents a table of contents for that year's volume, plus an index of the entire volume. Don't overlook the NGS Quarterly when doing your own research. When we use the computer constantly, it's easy to overlook the research aids on the shelf.

# Norwegian-American Bygdelags

Norwegian-American bygdelags are organizations made up of immigrants (usually from one rural area of Norway) and their descendants. Bygdelags often have Norwegian members also, whose families included emigrants to America.

Each bygdelag has a stevne (meeting) during the summer months. Stevne include many cultural and educational activities such as Norwegian music and dance, banquets featuring traditional Norwegian foods, workshops on the history and culture of the bygdelag's district in Norway, displays of Norwegian arts and crafts, and workshops for genealogical research. Stevne are usually held near research facilities and an optional tour of the facilities is often available.

Most bygdelags maintain a library and have a genealogist who will conduct research for members and nonmembers for a fee. The genealogist often brings bygdelag library materials to the stevne, so members may use the research materials and be assisted by the bygdelag genealogist.

Many bygdelags have their own Web homepages with links to information on their area of Norway or to other online genealogical research sites. For more information on the history and mission of bygdelags, see:

# Writing a Fictionalized Family History

Rather than just doggedly chasing down names, relationships, dates and locations, it's nice to stop once in a while and ponder what life was like for those people you just plunked into your database.


So, use your imagination. What did the room look like when they opened their eyes each

morning? What sort of activities kept them busy each day? What did they have for breakfast and who cooked it? What clothes did they wear and who made or mended them? What family member got on their nerves? Were they always exhausted by the end of the day?

If your imagination takes off, you may find yourself wanting to write one or more stories about your ancestors to help make the past come alive for others. If you do, there are a few important things to remember:

- Keep to your facts and keep the story accurate. People in the 17<sup>th</sup> century did not say "OK," for example.
- Make sure your audience knows that this is fiction hung on a skeleton of fact.
- Work hard to make your lead paragraphs interesting, drawing your reader into the story.
- Minimize the use of flashbacks or other means of jumping about in time. It usually just confuses the reader.

- Get someone you trust to edit your work and *do not get defensive* when they point out the inevitable parts that are unclear, unnecessary or boring.
- Decide on a point of view and stick to it.
   Third-person past is the easiest one for
  - beginning writers to handle. An example of this point of view is "He cooked a lonely dinner that night."
  - Decide on your level of detail. Are you going to describe events or are you going to add dialog and actions?
  - Portray people, not saints or devils.

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### ASI — A Swedish Treasure

Treasure may be found in Minneapolis at the American Swedish Institute (ASI). Founded in 1929 by newspaper publisher Swan J. Turnblad, the institute and its museum present the story of Swedish immigrants through their personal belongings. The Institute also hosts many activities, including Swedish language classes and folk arts and crafts.

The Institute is housed in the 1904 Turnblad family home, a fabulous castle-like mansion with exquisite décor in most of its 33 rooms. For genealogists with Swedish heritage, however, the most interesting part of the mansion may be the archive collection. The Institute has preserved an extensive collection of Swedish books, papers, photographs, microforms and audio recordings for use by family historians. The collection focuses on the history of the Turnblad newspaper, the Turnblad family history, Swedish immigration to the United States, Swedish-American life and culture, and Swedish history and culture.

The archive space, staff and open hours are limited. If you have an interest in using this collection, please call the Institute's archivist at 612-871-4907 to discuss your research needs and to make the necessary appointment.

# Canning Cemetery to Re-Open!

For the past six years, Randy and Susan King of Canning, South Dakota, have been saving a bit of South Dakota history. Back in 1999, they began by mowing the grass in the small abandoned cemetery near their home. Eventually, they began sprucing the place up and placing granite markers on the 13 known gravesites. Only three of the plots still retained their original, legible gravestones. With the cooperation of the Hughes County commissioners, a fence was erected in 2002 to surround and protect the area.

Last March, a resident's association was formed to maintain the cemetery and a request was placed with the commissioners to have the cemetery reopened. A title search of the land was completed in July, revealing that the land did in fact belong to the county and was actually twice as big as originally estimated.

At its August 3<sup>rd</sup> meeting, the county commissioners asked the resident's association to form a non-profit corporation and offered to pay for a detailed survey showing the existing plots. The county will then deed the land to the cemetery corporation, which will begin to sell new plots in the unused portion. Susan King said, "This has been a fun project and the county commissioners have all been very supportive."







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### Hughes County Marriages, 1885 to 1899, A to B

Beginning in this issue, we present data on marriage licenses issued in Hughes County, South Dakota during the years 1885 through 1889. Using a preliminary data set courtesy of the editor of *Genea-O-Log*, Susan Assmus and Doris Ivanoff have compiled a listing of more than 450 couples. Most (but not all) of these licenses may be found at the Deeds Office at the Hughes County Courthouse. The missing certificates may have been the result of using the license to marry in another county or instances in which the wedding never actually took place. For other licences, the original records are no longer available.

This issue lists both grooms and brides with surnames beginning with A or B. Following issues will complete the series alphabetically as space permits.


