- South Dakota was the 40th state in the USA; it became a state on November 2, 1889.
- <u>US territory status</u>: part of Michigan Territory in 1834, Wisconsin Territory in 1836, Iowa Territory in 1838, Minnesota Territory in 1849 and Dakota Territory in 1861
- <u>Territorial and State Censuses available</u>: 1885, 1895, 1905, 1915, 1925, 1935, 1945
- First federal census: 1900
- Statewide birth, death and marriage records began: 1905
- Population (as of 2010): 814,180 [South Dakota is the 46th most populous state in the USA]
- Major Rivers: Cheyenne River, Missouri River, James River, White River
- Number of Counties: 66
- Bordering States: Iowa, Minnesota, Montana, Nebraska, North Dakota, Wyoming

The Register of Deeds' Vital Records Department maintains birth, death, marriage, and burial record information. The Office works directly with the South Dakota Department of Health and Vital Records. Birth, death, and marriage records are also on file with the SD Dept. of Health.

The Register of Deeds' Office provides many services to the county and is the primary county record-keeping and archival office concerning vital statistics (marriage, birth and death records), land records (such as plats, deeds, mortgages, satisfactions, assignments, etc.), military discharge records, hospital liens, mechanics liens, county, state and federal tax liens, powers of attorney, fictitious name filings, UCC filings, etc.

If you are trying to find histories about a certain town or county, try checking on eBay. It is amazing the treasures you can find.

Online auction sites such as eBay are one of today's most popular Internet pastimes. Sellers submit items for sale, accompanied by a short description and often a photo. Auctions last for a pre-determined period of time (several days on average), during which potential buyers can submit their bids for the item online. At the end of the auction the seller and the winning bidder contact each other to arrange payment and delivery.

How does this relate to genealogy? Just about anything related to family history can be found for sale on eBay and other online auction sites. Books, city directories, diaries, family bibles, genealogy software and CD-ROMs, maps, military memorabilia, old newspapers, photos, postcards, yearbooks and even family group sheets are all offered on a regular basis. You can add reference resources to your genealogy library or learn more about your family through visual representations of their time and place in history. You may even be lucky enough to find specific references to your ancestors, such as maps which document the family homestead, obituary notices or family photos.

Searching eBay for Genealogical Treasures

If you're new to eBay and online auctions, then follow these simple guidelines to get started:

- Use the search engine to search for items related to your individual surnames or for items from a specific place or time period. Be sure to select the box which allows you to search both the titles and descriptions! You can also use the advanced search feature to exclude certain entries, which can be very important when you're searching for a common name (e.g. on a search for the surname RICE you could exclude such terms as cooker, anne, jerry, krispies, paper, etc.). Check eBay's search tips for even more search ideas.
- Be sure to search for common misspellings of your surnames, place names and terms such as genealogy (try searching for geneology or genealogy).
- As an alternative to search, try the browse feature to explore specific categories of items such as historical memorabilia, vintage clothing and accessories, maps and atlases, militaria, antique photos and more. There is even a section on eBay devoted specifically to genealogy.
- Check the seller's feedback rating before bidding on an item to be sure they don't have a history of complaints against them.
- Don't get carried away by the bidding! Set a limit and stick to it. eBay even offers a proxy
 bidding service. You enter your maximum amount and your bid will be automatically
 increased by the minimum required bid amount whenever someone outbids you until you
 have reached your maximum amount. If the item is really important to you, then check in on it
 right before it is due to end so you can make a final decision and put in a last-minute bid if
 desired.

There are wonderful items to be discovered – but make sure you don't get carried away and bid more than you really wanted to spend! Also be aware of sellers' histories, if there are complaints, be cautious.

List Your Assumptions

Posted: 05 April 2014

Assumptions serve purposes in research, but if not careful they can cross the line from being an assumption to becoming a fact. If you are stuck on an ancestor, write down everything you know about him from memory (place of birth, place of marriage, place of death, occupation, educational level, social class, religion, etc. etc.) without any references to anything.

Then go back and see what you have some documentation for. Statements for which you have no documentation may very well be assumptions about the ancestor that are incorrect.

Is the Name "Close Enough"

Posted: 29 Apr 2014

There is no hard and fast answer to when a name is "close enough" to be your ancestor. The variant spelling should sound like your actual ancestor's last name and differences in vowels usually are not as significant as one might think, depending upon how your ancestor pronounced his name.

Use other clues to determine if the "close enough" person is your ancestor. Is he:

- in the right location?
- acting in a way that is consistent with your ancestor?
- of a close enough age to be your ancestor?
- interacting with known associates of your ancestors?

Even answering all these questions with a "yes" is no guarantee, but it is a good start towards making certain that "close enough" name is really "close enough."

Ellis Island Name Changes

Posted: 16 May 2014

Contrary to popular belief, people did not "have their names changed" at Ellis Island. Immigration into Ellis Island required too much paperwork for that to happen and there were plenty of translators available when Ellis Island was in operation.

If your ancestor used a different name, it's more likely he chose it when he settled or when he naturalized. Some name changes were never officially recorded.

But the "name changes" at Ellis Island did not happen.

Do You Record the Why?

Posted: 07 May 2014

As you research through various materials, do you keep track (even briefly) of the reasons why specific records or materials were searched? That makes it easier to see your process should you need to re-evaluate and take your research in a different direction.

And those reasons get at your research assumptions, which sometimes can be incorrect.

FamilySearch Volunteers Set Historic Record

FamilySearch volunteers are amazing! On July 20th and 21st 2014, FamilySearch indexers and arbitrators from around the world joined together to set an international record for the greatest number of indexing participants in a single day! We *hoped* to have an unprecedented 50,000 contributors in a 24 hour period. FamilySearch volunteers excelled, surpassing that goal by 16,511! That's right—66,511 participants in one day! Incredible! We are grateful for the patience and persistence of many volunteers who faced technical difficulties due to an overwhelming response. These generous indexers and arbitrators made a true difference. Each record and each name indexed and arbitrated matters. It only takes one to open the door to linking generations of families together. Without question, thousands of lives will be changed as a result of this day's effort. While the focus for this challenge was on the total number of participants, a tremendous amount of indexing and arbitration work was accomplished as well. Here are the results for the number of records indexed and arbitrated.

Indexed: 4,682,746 Arbitrated: 941,932

Total Records Processed: 5.7 million

Inst. Means the Current Month

The abbreviation "inst.," as in "7th inst.," refers to a date in the present month. "Ult.," as in the "8th ult.," generally refers to the previous month

Census Dates Matter

While any census can contain incorrect information, keep in mind that census questions were to be answered as of the date of the census, commonly referred to as the "census date."

The 1910 census for your ancestor's residence may have been taken on 11 May 1910, but the questions were to have been answered as of 15 April 1910.

Some census-takers were more concerned about accuracy than others and some informants may have understood the "census date" versus "actual date" better than others.

Cold Notes

The longer you wait to type up or organize your onsite research, the colder it gets and the more likely you are to not completely remember what you wrote down.

Don't wait to write up that research. Cold notes are not as good as fresh ones.

What Have You Written Lately?

If you have been accumulating information and records, when was the last time you stopped gathering and wrote about what you have located? Don't forget to include where you obtained the information, a transcription or detailed summary of it, and a discussion of what you think it means.

You may be surprised what discoveries you make when you really get into writing up what you already have.

South Dakota's Past From the pages of the Capital Journal, Pierre

February 2, 1892
