FamilySearch.org Record Availability

Not all digitized records have been indexed. While indexing continues to move forward at a rapid pace and while many volunteers from around the world have joined in the effort, digitization continues to be a step ahead of indexing (if you would like to help index records, learn how got to the indexing like on FamilySearch.org. When you search historical records using an ancestor's name, your search includes only indexed records. To find your ancestor in unindexed records, you must browse the records, looking at each page for your ancestor's name. The FamilySearch icons don't differentiate between collections that have been indexed and those that have not been, only whether the actual records are available at FamilySearch. Some records at FamilySearch have limited access. You may receive a message or see an icon (icons are explained below) that indicates you don't have access to certain records. Restricted records are currently available only at family history centers and Familysearch affiliate libraries. This is usually because of contractual agreements between Familysearch and the record holders. In some rare instances, you will be able to view such records at a family history center only, not at a FamilySearch affiliate library. FamilySearch may receive permission in the future to share these records online, so keep checking back.

Icons near the records will help you distinguish what kind of availability to expect. In the catalog, icons are found in the Format column by the listed record. They are also listed next to the record title in the Records section. Here is an explanation for some of the icons:

These three icons are the most prevalent ones. The first is a tree, which means the person you are searching for is one a tree in the system. The second is for a transcribed record. And the third means there are images of the original record.

To Join or Renew a Membership:

Even if a family genealogy has not been published for your ancestors, local and family histories can offer insight into the places your ancestors lived and the people they may have encountered during their lifetime.

Before you head to the local library or bookstore, however, take time to explore the hundreds of thousands of genealogies, local histories and other items of genealogical interest available online for free!

Online Books

Imagine a free virtual online library of rare historic books from all over the world to help you discover rich, unknown details about the lives of your ancestors. There are over 200,000 historic volumes online for free at <u>books.FamilySearch.org</u>. The growing online collection, which began in 2007, is invaluable to genealogists and family historians in finding their ancestors.

Hathi Trust www.hathitrust.org

This may not be a site you've heard of, but they have more than five million books online of general interest with a very respectable collection of genealogy and local history. This site is a full text search site. That means you can search INSIDE the books in addition to searching titles and descriptions.

Google Books http://books.google.com

This is the granddaddy of the books sites. They purport to have north of four million books, scanned and uploaded for your reading pleasure.

Internet Archive http://archive.org

This site has about three million records – all full text books – no extracts or sample pages. Further, it has other media in its collection. You can find audio, video, and even old websites that are no longer active through the Wayback Machine.
